CHAIR AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR STATEMENT

At ShelterBox, we believe in a world where no family is left without shelter after disaster or in times of conflict.

This mission has remained true during our 21 years of disaster relief, but this year the need has been greater than ever. More than 113 million people were forced from their homes by conflict and natural disaster last year, more than any other time in history. Millions of families around the world are facing the triple threat: the climate crisis, conflict and COVID-19.

ShelterBox has remained flexible in the face of adversity, quickly changing how we operate to continue to provide our life-saving aid when our teams could no longer fly around the world. By leveraging our strong relationships with partners, implementing virtual training sessions, and adjusting our supply chain, we have been able to effectively reach the most vulnerable people around the world, despite the pandemic.



Following severe flooding in Odisha, India, families received shelter kits including tarpaulins, rope and tool kits, hygiene kits including soap, bucket and face masks, as well as other essential household items.

people were forced from their homes by conflict and natural disasters.

We have continued to innovate in terms of the items we are able to provide families. Over the last year, we added soap, masks and wash basins to our kits to help protect people from COVID-19. We are also trialing a new water filter in Cameroon that filters water directly out of large buckets, after receiving feedback from communities that it was difficult for them to pour the water from their buckets through the filter.

By working directly with communities, and utilizing their feedback to improve our responses, we are ensuring that people receive exactly what they need to self-recover.

Despite significant challenges here at home, our amazing supporters across Canada donated \$634,219 last year, ensuring we could reach those in greatest need. We are so grateful for every dollar we received. Your support has allowed us to reach families who have fled violence in Nigeria, Cameroon, Burkina Faso, the Syrian region, and Ethiopia; and families who lost everything to devastating weather events in Tanzania, Philippines, India, Sudan, and Honduras.

As the climate crisis worsens, the need for ShelterBox's life-saving aid is rapidly growing. ShelterBox is committed to providing the right aid, at the right time, for families and communities who may otherwise be forgotten. But we can't do it alone.


Our partnership with Rotary continues to be vital. Not only do Rotary Clubs across Canada donate every year to ensure ShelterBox can respond, but Rotarians and Clubs on the ground provide community connections, access, warehouse space, translators and more. This ensures responses are tailored to the local needs and are as effective as possible.

Disasters don't stop, and neither does ShelterBox thanks to your generosity. We are incredibly grateful for your continuous support. ShelterBox Canada remains as committed as ever to ensure no family is left without shelter, because we know that when you have a place to call home, hope follows.

YOUR SUPPORT IN ACTION

We know shelter is more than just a roof over your head. It is a basic human right and necessary for survival, but shelter also helps kick start the recovery process. Learn more about the impact of ShelterBox's responses, and the difference your donations make below.

At ShelterBox, we know that when we provide our high quality materials and training to communities affected by disaster, it enacts both short and longterm change. We customize each response, and then evaluate against our objectives to ensure we are being as effective as possible.

In the weeks and months following a response, as a result of receiving ShelterBox aid and training, families:

- Are protected from the weather and environmental extremes;
- Experience increased safety and security of their possessions;
- Have increased protection from water and vector borne diseases;
- Have reduced household displacement;
- Remain together and embedded in their communities;
- Build knowledge and skills to utilize the provided materials;
- Experience less stress and anxiety;
- Have increased privacy and retain their dignity.

In the longer term our responses lead to improved resilience and capacity for self recovery. This contributes to the following impact level changes:

- Improved psychological health and wellbeing;
- Improved access to and retention in education;
- Reduced morbidity and mortality;
- Security of tenure;
- Improved access to basic services;
- Strengthen social structures;
- Livelihood sustained;
- Community more resilient to future disasters.

IMPACT REPORT

Recovery happens when people have the right support at the right time. But we never claim responsibility for it, because it's the communities themselves who take the decisive action, who tell us what they need most, who rebuild their homes and get ready to start again. Our support is a powerful first step, but communities get themselves back on track.

CREATING A HOME

A home is more than a physical structure. It's a place to spend time with family, to get a good night's sleep, to play, to work, to feel safe and secure. It's a place to find privacy and time to yourself. For the people we support, it's a place with a future.

BURKINA FASO

Once heralded as beacon of peace and stability in West Africa, violence in Burkina Faso has led to the country having one of the fastest-growing displacement crises on the planet, with over one million people forced from their homes.

NONGOMA'S STORY

Nongoma and her seven children were forced to flee their village, leaving everything behind as a result of violence. Unfortunately, her husband was killed, leaving Nongoma on her own to support her children. They are now living in a displacement camp with other members of her community. ShelterBox provided Nongoma with a shelter, kitchen set, sleeping mats, mosquito nets and solar lamps.

She said: *"With the help of ShelterBox with new, beautiful tarpaulins, we are now well housed and I am very satisfied."*

BUILDING SKILLS AND KNOWLEDGE

We help people build skills and knowledge. Overcoming this global pandemic depends on effective local action, so we developed and shared a range of information resources in 2020 to help communities stop the spread of coronavirus as they rebuilt after disasters.

With our teams no longer able to work with families face-to-face, we also got creative and found new ways to share shelter building guidance. We know the communities we work with are the experts in building the homes they need using locally sourced materials. So our approach has always been to share the extra tips we've learned over two decades to help raise the quality of shelters even further.

To that end, we arranged remote training sessions on everything from foundations to solar lights and made instruction videos for our local partners to watch and share. We hosted live chats on WhatsApp and created step-by-step technical documents. As was the case throughout 2020, we weren't about to let a pandemic prevent families from taking control of their futures.

FLOODING IN INDIA

Monsoon rains and severe flash flooding hit most Indian states throughout June to October 2020. More than 17 million people were affected across the country.

This disaster intensified an already vulnerable situation as families were in the midst of recovering from the devastating effects of Super Cyclone Amphan, which tore through the Bay of Bengal in May 2020. ShelterBox responded in Odisha, where families had lost their homes, possessions and livelihoods.

RUNA'S STORY

Runa and her family tried to stay at home, but when the flood waters poured into their home, they had to evacuate. She was worried her house would collapse and everything would be lost. Sadly, her fears came true. Even when they could return to their homesite, there was no access to clean drinking water, and her children became sick.

ShelterBox, in partnership with Habitat for Humanity India were able to prove Runa's family with shelter, vital items including water filtration, and training to begin their recovery.

HELPING PEOPLE RETURN TO WORK



Emergency shelter is deeply connected to livelihood. When you have a place to call home, you can shift your focus to earning a living.

We often help people settle close to places where they can tend crops or keep livestock, and we provide the tools people need to work the fields or support trades. As communities rebuild and return to normalcy, we often find that homes double as shops or workshops.

TYPHOON VONGFONG, PHILIPPINES

Nora's family home, in Eastern Samar in the Philippines, was lost in a day. As Typhoon Vongfong finally eased up, she returned to the place where she had lived and saw only wreckage; most of the building had been washed out to sea. The coconut trees she depended on to make a living had also been torn up at the roots.

Our shelter materials helped Nora to build a home, but she also quickly began using them to earn an income. The lamp meant she could sell barbecues for families to cook with as night fell.

Very often our tools – from spades to tarpaulins – have a long life after shelters are finished. They are used for farming, for carpentry and for drying crops, creating a new sense of independence – and of hope.

“We’ve been able to start a small business again. The solar light we use at night time when we are selling barbecues.”

CAMEROON

REBUILDING COMMUNITIES

A strong community is crucial to building resilience and lifting the spirit of the people living in it. Living with friends, family and neighbours around you provides the physical, material and emotional support needed to recover.

By keeping families on their homesites whenever possible, that vital community connection can remain intact. When people are displaced by violence and cannot go home, new types of communities form. ShelterBox does everything we can to harness the power of community, and ensure each community is at the forefront of leading their recovery.

CAMEROON, CONFLICT

10.6 million people in the Lake Chad Basin of West Africa are in urgent need of humanitarian assistance as conflict and drought have forced people from their homes. ShelterBox is the sole provider of shelter to refugees arriving in Minawao Camp in Cameroon.

KALTOUMI'S STORY

Kaltoumi has ten children in her care. They were forced to flee their village after Boko Haram attacked. After a long journey with no provisions, Kaltoumi arrived at Minawao camp.

She and her family received two shelter kits, solar lamps, kitchen sets, ground mats, blankets and a water filter from ShelterBox and our partner IEDA relief. She said, these items have really helped. “I sleep in one the shelter kits with the youngest children and the elders have their own. All the items I received have been very useful to me”

She has become close to her new neighbours in the camp, and is hopeful for the future.



IN CAMEROON,

97% of people we spoke to said support from ShelterBox benefitted the wider community, and 86% of people said the mats we provide are often used for communal gatherings.

CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC

ShelterBox's role in flattening the global curve of the coronavirus pandemic.

Early 2020 brought unprecedented circumstances as a result of the global coronavirus pandemic. As a global organization, we took action and used our experience and expertise to adapt how we work to remain effective.

During this new humanitarian disaster, the vital importance of shelter has been made clearer than ever.

The virus is a deadly risk for vulnerable families who have lost their homes. The impact in places like crowded camps and makeshift settlements in Bangladesh, Ethiopia and Burkina Faso could be more devastating than anything we have seen so far.

Emergency shelter can save lives by slowing the spread of coronavirus.

Tents and shelter kits can provide a private space for families to isolate and keep distant from others while trying to reduce the spread of coronavirus.

Water filters help give families access to clean water and allow them to follow proper hand-washing precautions to help protect them from the virus. Other items like blankets and sleeping mats keep people warm and dry, cooking sets allow families to have warm meals and reduce sharing.

We have added soap, wash basins and masks to the aid we are able to provide. In addition to shelter and other essential items, these items help keep vulnerable families safe from COVID-19. We have also provided information about the spread of the virus and how to protect yourself as part of our community training.

Disasters don't stop

This pandemic will not be over until it is over everywhere. In most of the countries where we work, access to vaccinations are still virtually non-existent. ShelterBox has adapted our model to ensure we can continue to be there for the most vulnerable people after disasters around the world.

By working closely with partners, utilizing virtual platforms for community trainings, and adapting to the longer lead times needed to ship supplies globally, we have not only maintained our effectiveness, but grown to reach more people in the last year than we did in 2019.

Despite our adaptations, millions of people around the world are facing the triple threat – conflict/disaster, COVID-19, and the climate crisis. We will continue to do everything we can to provide these people with the tools they need to transform their lives, but we cannot do it without you. We urgently need additional funding to reach the most vulnerable around the world.



DISASTERS AND CORONAVIRUS

Four things to know about coronavirus and families living through disaster.

Coronavirus is **impacting the hospitals and health care systems in less developed countries far more severely** than in developed countries like Canada.

When you lose your home after a disaster or in a conflict, **your ability to stay safe and healthy is already compromised.**

Over-crowded conditions, lack of access to sanitization, and little to no health care means families living in these settlements are at even greater risk during this global pandemic.

The majority of the 82 million people driven from their homes by conflict live in the least developed countries in the world, where support is already limited.

Government-run displacement centers are overcrowded and under-resourced. Many do not have the capacity to support families during a coronavirus spread.

Tents and other emergency shelters will give families privacy and a place to isolate, and water carriers can provide much-needed access to clean water and sanitation.

Providing emergency shelter and other essential items after disaster not only helps families recover but can also offer a place where families can be together away from others in the midst of a coronavirus outbreak.

DEPLOYMENT FOCUS

In November 2020, Central America was hit by two consecutive hurricanes within two weeks. Hurricane Iota and Eta brought a wave of destruction across the region.

ShelterBox responded in Honduras, working in partnership with Rotary and Habitat to provide families with shelter kits, tarps, tools, solar light, blankets and more.

This response showed the power of partnership: each party brought their capacity, skills and resources to the table. ShelterBox provided equipment and aid items, organized international logistics and provided digital training and technical support. Our pre-positioned stock in our Panama warehouse enabled us to respond more quickly to the disaster.

Habitat para la Humanidad Honduras and The Rotary Club of San Pedro Sula's local knowledge, connections, and networks, were vital throughout the response from arranging importation to ensuring a community-led response.

REVIEW OF 2020-2021 FINANCES

Our Commitment

ShelterBox Canada is committed to using our supporter's funds as effectively and efficiently as possible. We do everything we can to make sure your donation makes the biggest impact possible for families who have lost everything. Prior to the pandemic, we had cautiously invested in growing and professionalizing our fundraising which has allowed us to reach more families and improve our operations.

ShelterBox Canada has been impacted by the coronavirus pandemic. The organization has experienced a significant decline in donations relative to historical trends. As a result, our expense ratios were skewed. Throughout the pandemic we have made concerted efforts to decrease spending and feel confident that ongoing cost mitigation efforts will provide the necessary support to sustain our organization in the face of this unprecedented event.

ShelterBox Canada applied for all available federal subsidies as noted in the wage subsidy line in the statement of operations.

We are confident that our recovery plan will get us back to our pre-pandemic fundraising levels, and target expense ratios.

A Note on the Audited Financial Statements

The financial statements for the fiscal year from July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021 were audited by Grant Thornton LLP, an independent audit firm. The financial statements are available on our website.

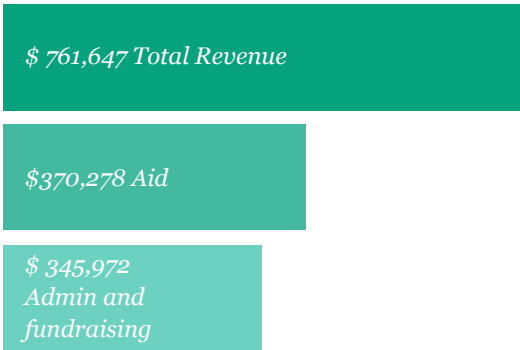
ShelterBox Canada received \$634,219 in donations in the year ended June 30, 2021. Of these donations \$286,482 were restricted by donors for the purchase and distribution of ShelterBox aid. ShelterBox Canada purchases aid directly from our suppliers. We have a Restricted Funds balance on the statement of operations due to a lag between the purchasing time and when we are invoiced by our suppliers. This lag does not affect the timely delivery of aid.

ShelterBox Canada also receives unrestricted donations for our fundraising, marketing, administrative, or mission activities.

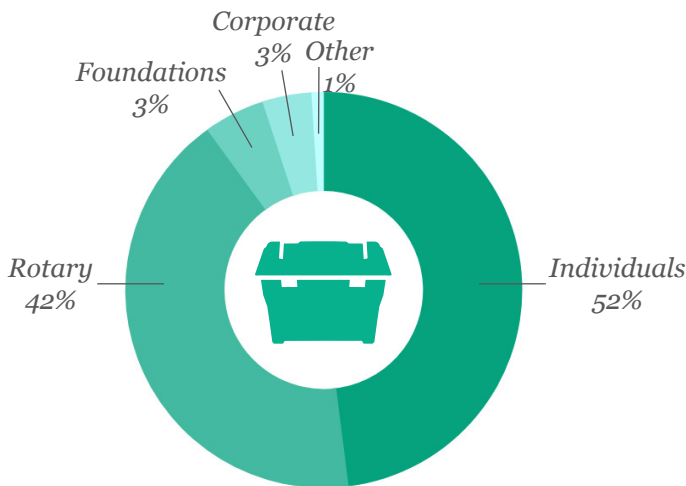
For the year ended June 30, 2021, ShelterBox Canada purchased and distributed \$370,278 worth of aid. At the end of the period, ShelterBox Canada held \$186,231 restricted for the purchase and distribution of aid that will be paid to our suppliers upon invoicing.
